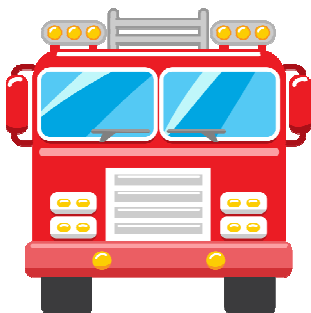


The Bullfrogs

“Our Community Market falls on the first of August which is pretty much the middle of winter, even though I have started to notice the sun rising a little earlier. However, it is still dark when our volunteers and the stall holders start to arrive to set up the market.

The market is prepared the afternoon before, again by our volunteers, by laying out the stall sites, roping off areas to control traffic, and putting out the direction signs on the local roads.

On market morning we have someone at the front entrance to direct people to their sites as other people pull out our marquees, tables, and chairs from the shed and move them to their destinations. The place is a hive of activity and, as soon as people have their stalls set up, they head over to get a morning coffee before the crowds start to arrive.

By 1pm the crowds have dwindled, Mum's cakes have disappeared, the music finishes and people start to pack up. Again, our volunteers pack down our marquees and load them, with the tables and chairs, onto our trolleys to go back into the shed. The Council comes around to empty the rubbish bins and everyone goes home, satisfied with another successful market.

After more than ten years we have established a smooth running system for organising a market that runs entirely by volunteers. Of course, as with all volunteer organisations, people come and go for various reasons and we are always appreciative of new people coming forward to help. There is no pay but the intrinsic benefits of being part of a willing community is not something that can be measured by money.

We are a Committee of Council run by volunteers and we are always open for people to become involved, either in a big way or a small way. All of the contributions, from staffing the greeting tables at the market, to helping to set up the annual art show, to being a committee member, and everything else is what makes our community a better place. The National emergency siren will be tested on **Monday 27th July at 2pm** and a warning message will be transmitted to your mobile phone. This is purely an exercise to ensure that the system works, and if it is successful, it will be made active in October 2026 in preparation for the fire season. Please notify any elderly neighbours and visitors who may not have seen the media releases regarding this. Occasionally the communication system fails owing to fire, flood or damage so this is another layer of protection for our population.

Please book a table and help us to keep our volunteers busy developing projects in the community. All monies raised are spent here in Valla Beach. From cliff-face goat-track to one of NSW's finest championship golf courses, Nambucca Heads Club marks 100 years

Nambucca Heads Island Golf Club members, the wider community and one of Australia's finest professional players gathered to mark the club's centenary on 27 June at one of the most significant celebrations ever seen in the Mid North Coast tourist town. The guest list at a 100-year dinner included Nambucca Valley Mayor Gary Lee and two-time US Open player and TV mainstay Paul Gow who was the keynote speaker.



Club President Geoff Harris used the occasion to officially launch an online book chronicling the club's history, co-authored by Mike Post and Chris Knight.

The nearby golf clubs of Coffs Harbour and Grafton are also marking their centenary in 2026, while the Nambucca history includes some comical moments:

In the 1990s, it was a popular social pastime for beverage-enhanced members at The Island to attempt to drive a ball across the Nambucca River, until one day they decided to aim at a fisherman in his tinny. The police were called and this recreational activity was subsequently banned.

The book also talks to the 'shot of the century', when current member Trevor Peck miscued his tee shot on the short 13th. The ball ricocheted off some skinny sheoaks and came to rest next to the porcelain inside the cubicle of the sole on-course toilet."

"Magical Fungi - Now is the time to look out for fungi's fruiting bodies.

Scattered around our village are native boletus, amanitas, anemone stinkhorns (that look like starfish and smell like rotting meat), delicate pale Parasols and plenty of others, including bracket fungi attached to wood.

The living world is mostly invisible. There are more microbes on our skin, in our mouths and guts than stars in the Milky Way. They evolved with us and keep us alive. Fungi live everywhere on and inside us as well.

Soil also keeps us alive, producing 95% of the food we

eat. Good soil relies on microbes and fungi. Most fungi are made up of hyphae, long, branching, filaments and one teaspoon of soil can hold 10 metres of these networks.

Australia has up to 250,000 species of fungi, with only 12,000 being formally described. Fungi are in their own category, closer to humans than to plants, but their labyrinthine (mycorrhizal) networks enable plants and trees to exchange nutrients and chemical communications. They are top recyclers of decomposing dead organic matter and without fungi, life on the Earth would expire.

And just to note. Lichens are a symbiosis between a fungus and a photosynthetic partner like green algae. They are important for breaking down rock to create soil, and are now used as sensitive indicators of air pollution."

Our last week was so magical and grounding we were lucky to have Aunty Bee to come down and engage in a wagay (fire) with our class. It was so special to share this, with some of the children's families staying, to connect as a group in our community. The whole class gathered in a yarning circle around the wagay to share stories of our time on country as we cooked damper on a stick and drank homemade lemon myrtle tea. Some of the children named parts of the community in a landmark and mapping experience:



Saylah: “The magical track”-the foot track leading down to Jagun Reserve.

Otto: “That’s the grass lands, no one knows about the grass lands” – the long grass on the walk from oval to café”.

Indigo: “I like to whisper to the love heart tree, you can make a wish” – we pass near the foot bridge

Raffy: “I love our bush classroom there’s always so many insects, I like insects”.

Other classes will attend Gaagal Guul (beach school) and Bindarray Guul (river school) next term you may see them out in the community. How lucky we are to share this amazingly beautiful nature-based community!



In other news from the Preschool, we have been extremely grateful being invited to the Valla Tavern to take part in raising money for our preschool, by selling raffle tickets. The money we raise is going towards a new sandpit for our children, the previous sandpit has been enjoyed for an estimated 26 years and we have even had reports that it was hand dug by members of our community. We have been investigating and planning, getting the children's ideas and voices about what they would like the sandpit to look like, and what features they want it to have. Some ideas include having crusher dust, a mud mixing space and a gravel pit. We ask if anyone in the community has any memories or experiences about the sandpit, that have held strong in their memories to share back with us, we would love to hear from you.

Wattle Day 1st September: The search for a national floral emblem

Wattle Day and Events surrounding Wattle Day had their humble beginnings in Hobart, Tasmania, in **1838** and culminated 150 years later in Canberra. In 1988 *Acacia pycnantha* was officially proclaimed the Australian floral emblem and four years later the first of September was proclaimed as Wattle Day.

In 1910 Wattle Day was celebrated on 1st September in NSW. In 1912, the then Prime Minister Andrew Fisher suggested that wattle be included in the new Commonwealth Coat of Arms. Wattle has been used in the design of Australian stamps and the most recent banknotes, as well as for many awards in the Australian Honours system.

A century ago sprigs of wattle and wattle badges were sold to raise money for wounded soldiers in the First World War. National Wattle Day is a day that unifies all Australians in a celebration of what it is to live in Australia and be Australian. In 1916, New South Wales changed the date of their Wattle Day celebrations to August 1. They used the earlier flowering (and more familiar) Cootamundra wattle rather than the

golden wattle. From 1992, September 1 was declared as National Wattle Day for Australia and the external Territories of Australia. Wattle Day used to be about patriotism, but it has evolved to address conservation too. Take a minute to learn what you can do for the environment and plants around you, and start making small changes for a better planet. Encourage others to take up the conservation cause too. The resilient wattle species is said to represent the resilience of the Australian people. The golden wattle also symbolizes remembrance and reflection.

“Citizen science saves another forest from the chopping block

Recently a group of citizen scientists successfully protected another forest from logging when they identified 191 greater glider den trees in Glen Elgin – in a forest where Forestry Corporation NSW reported only one. In June and July, the group of concerned citizens – including nurses, carpenters, arborists and teachers – attended two citizen science camps in Glen Elgin State Forest, just outside of Glen Innes.

This forest was due for immediate logging, but after the first five nights, Forestry Corporation of NSW suspended its logging operations.



The citizen scientists, armed only with torches and mapping apps, spent hours each night searching for the endangered greater glider. Each den tree identified now has a 50-metre exclusion zone around the tree, which cannot be logged. “Citizen science is crucial to the survival of greater gliders in logging operations,” Valla resident and forest campaigner Clancy Barnard said. “NSW Forestry Corporation is legally only required to survey a tiny fraction of their logging operation area for gliders. A recent example is in Styx River State Forest where Forestry found four glider dens, while citizen scientists found more than 600.”

Citizen Applied Science and Forest Action NSW’s Micah “Bullet” Weekes said Forestry surveys are generally only carried out from access roads, rather than deep in the forest where the animals reside. “Because of this, citizen science is a crucial defence against destructive, devastating logging practices, that while legal, fail to properly protect endangered species of flora and fauna,” Weekes said.

Recently, logging operations have been halted in other forests like Styx River State Forest and Enfield State Forest, and harvest areas drastically reduced in places like Barrington Tops State Forest and Moogem State Forest thanks to citizen scientists identifying dens.

“This in itself, speaks volumes for the importance of citizen science, carried out by people who are not employed by a corporation tasked with cutting down critical habitat trees for endangered species, much of which is turned to woodchip, rather than protecting them,” Weekes said.

“Across NSW, citizen scientists are increasingly becoming the last line of defence for Australian native animals against an archaic, outdated, financially unsustainable practice costing taxpayers tens of millions of dollars each year, destroying irreplaceable century old forests, and increasing the frequency and intensity of bushfires.”

“Our Great Koala National Park (GKNP) is at risk!

The NSW Government's promise for the Great Koala National Park (GKNP) was conditional on the adoption of a Carbon Credit Scheme by the Federal government. This has now occurred with the adoption of the [Improved Native Forest Management](#) (INFM) method on 25 June 2026. The NSW government will now seek to register the GKNP as a 'project' under the INFM to qualify for the proceeds of sale of the carbon credits generated by not logging the public native forests contained within the proposed GKNP. This will generate an estimated \$300 million over 15 years which the NSW government plans to use to fund ongoing management of the GKNP.

The implications of the INFM are far reaching and will provide the NSW government with the incentive to STOP LOGGING in all NSW public native forests, something forest conservationists have campaigned on for decades.

Although this is wonderful news, it also has a down side in that the sale of the carbon credits is likely to go to fossil fuel polluting industries thereby potentially delaying the transition away from fossil fuels. In a perfect world, we would love to see the forests protected in perpetuity AND no fossil fuel pollution, but we must be pragmatic and acknowledge that is not going to happen and INFM is the only option on the NSW table which will protect native forests sooner rather than later or worst still, never.

Although adopted by the government, the INFM is now at risk of being 'disallowed' in the Senate. The National Party is planning to table a Disallowance Motion when parliament resumes on 18 August. They are pushing for support from Australian Greens and independent senators that are not happy about the fossil fuel industry buying forest carbon credits and enabling them to continue polluting (although they already buy credits elsewhere and will continue to pollute with or without the INFM). There is a very real risk a disallowance motion will succeed.

We must not let the pursuit of perfection (protecting forests AND stopping fossil fuel pollution) be the enemy of the good (protecting our precious native forests and all the values they contain). If the INFM is disallowed in the Senate, the GKNP is unlikely to get up in the NSW parliament in October when the GKNP Bill is expected to be tabled. This outcome is unthinkable to all those who have campaigned so hard for over ten years. It would mean a resumption of industrial scale logging in our native forests with devastating consequences especially for Koalas and Greater gliders.

We are urging folks to email senators David Shoebridge senator.shoebridge@aph.gov.au, Mehreen Faruqi senator.faruqi@aph.gov.au, David Pocock Senator.David.Pocock@aph.gov.au and Lidia Thorpe senator.thorpe@aph.gov.au to express support for the INFM, the GKNP and the protection of NSW public native forests and importantly to ask that they NOT support any Disallowance Motion.
